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Введение

Практическое пособие предназначается для студентов 1 курса специальностей 1-1 51 01 01 «Геология и разведка полезных ископаемых» и 1-33 01 02 01 «Геоэкология» для самостоятельной домашней работы при подготовке к занятиям по английскому языку.

Практическое пособие состоит из комплекса грамматических упражнений, направленных на закрепление грамматического материала, и текстов для домашнего чтения с комплексом упражнений, предназначенных для развития навыков чтения.

Грамматические упражнения в практическом пособии подобраны с учетом тем, которые должны знать студенты 1 курса специальностей 1-1 51 01 01 «Геология и разведка полезных ископаемых» и 1-33 01 02 01 «Геоэкология»: Каждый раздел завершается рядом тестовых заданий, дающих возможность проверить уровень знаний.

Все упражнения, предлагаемые после прочтения текста, можно разделить на два вида: лексические и устно-речевые. Первые предусматривают отработку правильности употребления основных лексических и фразеологических единиц. Цель вторых — многократное повторение определенных конструкций и речевых моделей для выработки автоматизированных навыков устной речи. Тексты также предназначаются для развития навыков просмотрового чтения, самостоятельной работы со словарем для извлечения основной информации, а также для расширения репродуктивного словарного минимума.
