ПРЕДИСЛОВИЕ

Практическое пособие по грамматике английского языка предназначено для студентов факультета иностранных языков дневной формы обучения специальности 1-02 03 06 «Иностранные языки (английский, немецкий), (английский, французский)» при изучении темы «Местоимение». Содержит практические задания, целью которых является формирование и совершенствование навыков и умений, связанных с особенностями данного языкового аспекта.

Пособие разделено на семь разделов, каждый из которых даёт полное представление о функционировании определенной группы местоимений в предложении, а также предлагаются два раздела с итоговыми тестами для контроля усвоения знаний по данному грамматическому материалу. Все упражнения имеют коммуникативную направленность и сгруппированы по принципу «от простого к сложному».

Практическое пособие ставит своей целью совершенствование грамматических навыков студентов по теме «Местоимение» в устной и письменной речи. Оно рассчитано как для практических занятий, так и для самостоятельной работы студентов, с последующим контролем со стороны преподавателя, а также может быть использовано для парной работы, которая может осуществляться при помощи взаимопроверки. Возможность самостоятельной работы и взаимопроверки развивают в студентах уверенность в собственных силах и интерес к изучению английского языка.
